

## A 2♥ response to a 1♠ opening bid promises a five card suit

After an opening bid of one of a suit, responder can generally bid a new suit at the two level with a 4 card suit, provided that he has 10 or more points (including length points).

The only exception is that a 2♥ response to 1♠ promises a 5 card suit. The main reason is to make it easy to find a 5-3 heart fit, which will normally play better than 3NT.

If the 2♥ response could be a four card suit, North 1 might be tempted to rebid 2♠; North 2 would probably bid 2NT. With an assured 8+ heart fit both North 1 and North 2 can happily raise to 3♥.

What happens when the responder to a 1♠ opening has only four hearts? Most of the time he will have a four card minor which can be bid instead. When responder doesn't bid the four card heart suit, a 4-4 heart fit will rarely be missed because if opener is 5-4 in spades and hearts he will rebid hearts.

Responder bids  $2\clubsuit$ , giving opener a chance to rebid  $2\blacktriangledown$  with four hearts, which responder will raise to  $3\blacktriangledown$ . (If opener instead bids  $2\spadesuit$  or  $2\spadesuit$ , responder rebids 2NT.)

The only awkward situation occurs when responder's shape is 4333 with four hearts. Responder now has 2 options:

- (a) Bid NT at the appropriate level, or ...
- (b) Respond 2♣ on a 3 card suit (commonly known as 'inventing' a suit).

This is not as dangerous as it might seem. If opener rebids  $2 \checkmark$  you can then bid  $2 \checkmark$ . If he rebids his spades you can show delayed support with a bid of  $3 \spadesuit$ . If he bids  $2 \checkmark$  you can pass or invite with  $3 \checkmark$ . If he raises  $2 \spadesuit$  to  $3 \spadesuit$ , he will normally have a 5 card spade suit (5-4 in spades and clubs). Responder can therefore go back to spades with a  $3 \spadesuit$  bid.
