With a 4-4-4-1 shaped hand you are going to have to bid two four card suits. There is a good chance that partner will respond with your singleton suit, in which case you are going to have to tell a lie about the length of your first suit, holding only four cards instead of the promised five! There is an unwritten Acol rule that if you have to tell a lie with your bid, lie in a minor suit – never in a major. Your No.1 objective should always be to find an 8 card fit in a major if one exists, so the bidding of major suits should always be honest.

There is no perfect solution but a good system to use with 4-4-4-1 hands is:


- Singleton club: open 1♥ if partner responds 2♣ rebid 2♦
 Singleton diamond: open 1♣ if partner responds 1♦ rebid 1♥
- ➤ Singleton heart: open 1 → if partner responds 1 ▼ rebid 1 ♠
- ➤ Singleton spade: open 1 → if partner responds 1 ★ rebid 2 ★

The only slightly awkward situation is the first one, where the singleton is a club. By opening $1 \checkmark$ (partner responds $2 \clubsuit$) and rebidding $2 \spadesuit$ you are promising 5 hearts so if partner has just three hearts he will raise you to $2 \checkmark$, thinking he has found an 8 card fit. However his 2-level response promises 10+ points so with a combined 23+ points* a contract of $2 \checkmark$ has good chances.

There are several mental gadgets you can use to help you remember:

- > red suit singleton: open the suit below the singleton
- black suit singleton: open the middle of the touching suits

or remember:
