Answer: 1NT

With 8 points you have to bid but you are too weak to bid 2♣. You do not satisfy the rule of 14. You have to bid a Dustbin 1NT. This bid does not promise a balanced hand. It is just a point count – 6-9 HCP

Answer: 1♠

You are just strong enough to bid. Do not bid 2♣. "Do not bypass a 4 card major". Partner may have five hearts and four spades

Answer: 2♣

Easily satisfies the Rule of 14. A better bid than a Dustbin 1NT which partner might pass.

Answer: 2♥

With 16 points a slam may be on, but you still make a simple non-jump bid. Your new suit bid is forcing – partner will not pass. The best contract might be 3NT, 4♥, 4♠, or a slam. Leave as much bidding space as possible to find the best contract. You can show your strength with your rebid.

Answer: Pass

With only 4 HCP, don't bid 2♥. Partner will be misled about your strength; if partner has 19 points and 4 hearts he will bid 4♥ which will probably go off.

Answer: 1

With this 15 point balanced hand and no likely fit in a major you might be thinking about bidding 3NT but that takes up a lot of bidding space. Your 1♦ bid is forcing. You can always bid 3NT with your rebid. Partner may rebid 3♣ (6 card suit and 16-18 points) in which case a club slam may be your best contract.

Answer: 1♠

You don't need to jump to 2♠. A bid of 1♠ is forcing. 3NT might be the best contract. You can show your shape and strength on the next round.

Answer: 1NT

You show a balanced hand with 15-16 points so show your point count range by bidding no Trumps at the lowest available lee

Answer: 2NT

You planned to open 1♥ and rebid 2NT, and that's what you now do.

Answer: 2NT

You have 15 HCP and originally planned to open 1♥ and rebid 1NT but partner's 2♠ rebid has prevented you from doing so. You have to bid 2NT, but that's not a concern. Partner's bid promises at least 9 HCP so with a combined 24+ points you should be comfortable playing in 2NT. After the 2-level response your bid shows 15-18 HCP so partner will almost certainly bid on. You have the strength to bid 3NT but you should give partner the opportunity to describe her hand further. Partner may have a very unbalanced hand with long clubs, and the right contract might be 5♠.

Answer: 2♥

You have an unbalanced minimum opening hand so you just repeat your suit at the lowest available level

Answer: 3♥

You have 16 points and a good 6 card suit so can repeat your hearts with a jump rebid.

Answer: 4♣

You have 17 points but with an excellent 6 card suit your hand is worth an upgrade. Partner's 2-level response shows at least 8-9 points, so the partnership has enough for game. A rebid of 3♠ is a limit bid which partner might pass with a minimum hand and spade shortage so you should bid game.

Answer: 3♠

You have 15 HCP but now that an 8 card spade fit has been found you can add two shortage points for your two doubletons. With 17 total points you are strong enough to make a game invitational bid of 3. With 8+points partner should bid game.

Answer: 4

You have 14 HCP but now that an 8+ card spade fit has been found you can add five shortage points for your diamond void. With 19 total points you are strong enough to bid $4 \stackrel{\bullet}{•}$.
